ARTIST SPOTLIGHT

Jon Neuse

Afraid of color?? Not Jon Neuse!! Line, shape, depth and value are all important artistic elements, but the playfulness of colors and how they interact elicit an emotional response from him. He approaches his work in a whimsical way, fascinated by the ways that form and color work together and at the same time compete with one another for our attention.


Though his role as an artist began later in life (he had many prior career iterations; Jon worked in corporate America, led seminars in development, and taught at the University level), it was during his childhood on a hot summer day in Texas that he discovered his fascination with color. Smearing his mother's red lipstick onto a wall proved to be a seminal

experience, and laid the groundwork for his artistic endeavors. Life experiences, including his youth in Texas, travel, several marriages, multiple careers and a stint in the Peace Corps in Afghanistan during the 60s, have all played an important role in Jon's art. These experiences enter his work as memories, naturally bleeding into his thought process.

People, faces, landscapes and nonobjectional abstracts become subject matter for Jon. Over the years he has worked with watercolors, oils, acrylics, collages and on an intaglio press which has had for 20+ years. Experimentation with these mediums led to a series of circus prints, which, a year into working on them, he realized were actually about his family. At the time, he had teenagers, a wife, and parents, and all of the daily life issues that go along with family. Says Jon, "the circus is full of danger and excitement and opportunity. It spoke well to our issues." He's recently developed an interest in smaller collages and accordion books, which tend to be more intimate. The smaller scale draws the viewer in and forces them to examine the work more closely. Remembered experiences are his preferred subject matter – he completes work in his studio relying solely on his recollection of places and events, and the titles become an explanation of where these places are.

Recently, Jon created bodies of work that focus on relationships (marriage and divorce), contemporary events (Roe v. Wade and mass shootings) and solitary moments (gender and cancer). Generally, he works on several pieces at a time, which inevitably lead to the different pieces and media influencing each other.

When asked what advice he would give to his younger self, Jon replied "just do a lot of work! Learn from each piece, and learn how to talk about the art you're making so you can be critical about it; you have to be able to sit back and talk about what is working and what's not. Enjoy what you're doing!" With that advice, it's not surprising that Jon sees himself as more of a teacher than an artist. - The Art Center charges a \$5 administration fee for every registration cancellation or class transfer to cover administrative costs.

MATERIALS

Materials fees and model fees not included in tuition must be paid with class registration.

Photography students should bring their own camera. Ceramics students supply their own tools and clay (which may be purchased at the Art Center). The average materials cost per session for beginners is about \$35. Firing and glazing fees are calculated by dimension and are paid at the front desk.

(B) Beginner: Student has no experience with the medium or needs a fundamental knowledge of techniques and materials.

(AB) Advanced Beginner: Student needs more instruction or a refresher on fundamental techniques or needs help to solve basic problems with the medium.

(I) Intermediate: Student has already completed several works in this medium and has begun exhibiting. The student is able to solve many problems independently, is developing design and composition skills and wants to try, or is experimenting with, a variety of techniques.

(AD) Advanced: Student is able to work independently and seeks critique from the instructor or peers. The student has developed a style and can discuss the concept behind the work and has begun the process of creating a resume and portfolio.

(ALL) All Skill Levels: The class is open to students of all levels.

[CORE CLASS]: A fundamental class that may be a good entry into a new medium.
